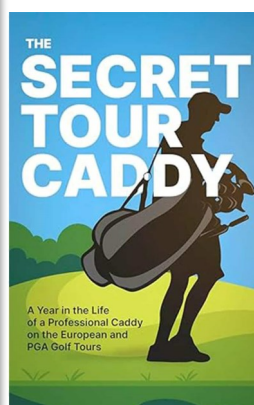

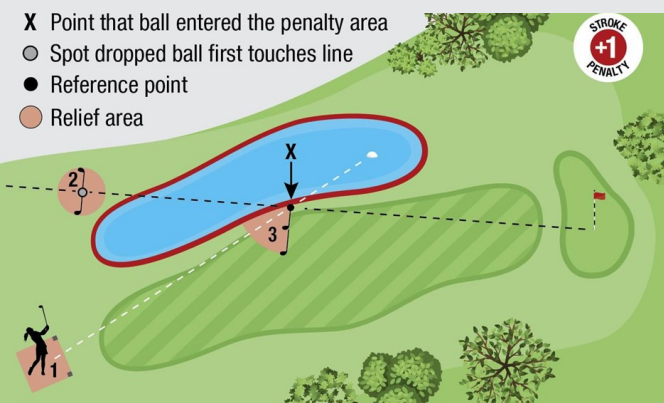

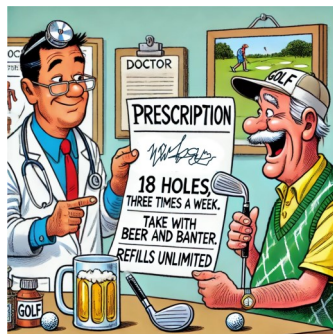

Rules: Ball Lost in Penalty Area

We have all been in the Percy Beck from time to time but what happens if Percy has taken your ball for a little ride or you otherwise can't find it? To avoid the walk of shame to play another ball from where you last played a shot (Stroke and Distance penalty for a lost ball) you have to know OR be virtually certain that your original ball went into the Penalty area. Did you or a playing partner see it go in? Was it rolling towards the beck and is it not visible on this side of the beck? If you are certain that it went in then you have the following relief options (under penalty of one stroke). Refer diagram, left:

- 1 Replay your shot from where you hit last (Stroke & Distance)
- 2 Take back-on-the-line relief. Drop the ball in a one club radius circle, outside the penalty area keeping the point where you estimate your ball entered the Penalty Area and the flag in a line
- 3 Take lateral relief (Red Penalty Areas only). Drop the ball in a two club length area (not nearer the hole) using where your ball is estimated to have entered the Area as the reference point.
