Polish up your short game

the green I always try to remember the simple phrase *Putt, Chip, Pitch* to reduce the potential for errors. By that I mean, when at all possible, putt the ball.

If that isn't possible, try chipping (i.e. the ball runs more than it flies). Use a simple

chipping technique similar to putting with hands down the grip and the toe down. Only Pitch (i.e. ball in the air more than running on the ground) when you absolutely have to. For example to get over an intervening bunker.

Hopefully that will reduce the instances of duffing or overhitting your shots to the pin and give you more opportunities for a one putt.
